3000 km tandem 'End Polio' bike ride

Dear DG Neta,

My wife, Joyce, and I are Rotarians (Rotary Club of South Launceston) who plan to undertake a 3000km tandem 'End Polio' unsupported bike ride from Adelaide to Sydney via Melbourne, commencing after Easter. We undertook a similar 3000km ride across the Nullarbor in 2022, which raised about \$38,000.

We have a new itinerary planned which will pass through your district and, following the pattern of our previous ride, we would like to visit, do a presentation and solicit End Polio donations in as many clubs as we can manage along the route. We would very much appreciate your endorsement of our ride and would be grateful for any support you can give us by alerting the clubs in your district. The ride will take about seven weeks and is both unsupported and self funded, so that we would also very much appreciate any offers of Rotary hospitality on the nights that we visit. With your permission we will contact the following clubs with our schedule and a request to make a presentation and solicit a club donation.

You will appreciate both our physical limitations (we're both in our mid seventies) in cycling between clubs and difficulties presented by meeting nights which seem to be predominantly on Wednesdays, so our progress through your district may appear a little haphazard but was dictated by the need to maximise the number of clubs we can visit.

Additionally, our previous experience of a fund raising ride made it quite clear that, despite numerous appeals in the media (TV, radio and press) along the way, our donations came almost exclusively from Rotarians in the form of a club donation – a donation which might well have come as a regular annual donation without our visit. We are still grappling with how we can expand the pool of donors and our thoughts, at present, are that we should try to harness the power of social media by getting Rotarians to ask all their social media contacts to make a very small donation to the cause, \$6, under the banner of 'hitting polio for six'. A donation portal is being set up and we will contact you again later with more details in the hope that you might persuade all Rotarians in your district to push this idea amongst their social media contacts.










EDUCATION in NEPAL



In March, this year a RAWCS team returned to Sindhuli, Nepal to continue construction of the Sindhuli Community Technical Institute – SCTI after a covid pause.

Working in partnership with the Rotary Club of Kathmandu, SCTI provides higher education opportunities, equivalent to our TAFE system for the youth of the Sindhuli valley. One of the key drivers to establish the local educational facility was to reverse the trend of young ones leaving the area by providing trade and diploma courses.

From humble beginnings the expansion of the school has been remarkable, credit to Principal Ambar Deep Devkota, his foresight to offer a variety of courses in civil engineering, survey, science, veterinary and basic building trades will have long term benefits. The RAWCS connection includes free sewing classes and a primary school student sponsorship program to supply uniforms, shoes, books, bags, and a meal to needy students coordinated by the local Rotaract Club.

The RAWCS teams have been helping with the construction of classrooms - installing


suspended ceilings, wiring and painting. Now with the introduction of a training course for nursing to commence shortly a dormitory, canteen and dining hall are under construction, so more work in the pipeline.

Peter Elias – RAWCS - SCTI Project Manager, from the Rotary Club of Albury, joined by Bruce Duffy RC South Wagga had a quick visit to Sindhuli in November to scope ou the works for the upcoming RAWCS team in March / April 2024 to complete. Electricity supply and sewer disposal at the school is under control but a reliable water supply is the problem.

The team plan to help address the water issue as the highest priority, then progress other construction works if time, resources and funds allow.

The last month of my exchange has been one of the busiest of the whole year. We had the end of school/graduation celebrations, Christmas, New Years and much more. I feel really weird that my exchange is coming to an end. I'm both excited to see everyone in Australia again and be back in my home but also incredibly sad to leave the new home I've made here in Argentina.

I mostly just feel grateful for the amazing year I've had. I've met the most incredible people that now have such a special place in my heart, seen some of the most beautiful views and places (I would say) in the world, had amazing experiences such as going in a boat under the Iguazú Falls and countless other once-in-a-lifetime opportunities. This year has been better than I ever dreamed and I'm endlessly grateful to my Rotary club Benalla and everyone for making it possible.

It's pretty hard to summarise any normal year in words, let alone an exchange year. I've been in Germany for almost 9 months now and it's surreal to look back on everything I've achieved in that time, and the opportunities I still have.

In the last few months I've had the opportunity to travel far and wide through Germany. The highlight for me has been the Deutschland tour in March/April. We (18 other exchange students and myself) spent close to 3 weeks travelling across Germany and learning about the cities we visited. It was an incredible opportunity to learn more about German culture and practise our language skills. The 2022/23 inbounds have become some of my closest friends, and saying goodbye was definitely difficult, though it made me a lot more grateful for the time I still have left.

I've had chances to meet 3 different sets of people and live in 3 different environments, and I feel that it's given me a better perspective on life here as a whole, instead of just as a specific experience.

I just want to absorb as much of Germany and my life here as I can before January.

Of course none of this would have been possible without the combined support of Mindelheim Rotary, the Rotary Club of Kinglake Ranges and Mansfield Rotary, and I owe them more than they can imagine, and hope that sharing my experiences will encourage others to pursue an exchange in the future. RYDA WORKSHOPS

At the end of November, the Rotary Club of Albury hosted 2 days of RYDA workshops. What another Rotary acronym - yes RYDA - Rotary Youth Driver Awareness a road safety education program developed by RSE - Road Safety Education limited and delivered across Australia and New Zealand for just over 20 years.

Since 2001, RYDA has been supporting youth development in a number of areas including social resilience and anticipating and managing risk. This provides students a unique opportunity to set road safety goals and build strategies alongside their friends, who they will most likely be riding with as drivers or passengers. RYDA is an Australian program that draws on an international expert Advisory Council to ensure it meets best-practice in road safety education.

Australia has seen significant improvements in road safety over the past 2 decades, however the number of fatalities on our roads is failing to decline fast enough to meet the target of zero deaths by 2050. Young drivers and their passengers are over-represented, making up 22% of fatalities despite making up less than 10% of the population. This makes road trauma the second highest cause of death for Australians aged 17-25. The need is even more acute in regional and remote Australia. 3 in 4 youth driver and passenger fatalities occur on regional or remote roads. But only 1 in 4 Australia youths live in regional or remote areas, making them 8 times more likely to die on our roads than youths in major cities.

The challenge of road trauma is much bigger. For every young driver or passenger who dies in regional or remote Australia, 12 are seriously injured, requiring hospitalisation. Nearly all of these deaths and injuries are preventable, with human error being a factor in over 90% of crashes. RYDA is designed to reduce the margin of human error.



A number of Clubs have been running the RYDA workshops across our District for some time, now we can include Albury to that list. Over 200 Year 10 students from Albury High, Murray High and James Fallon attended the workshops and the feedback has been overwhelmingly positive. The sessions explore - decision making and the choices you make, peer pressure, analysis of risky situations and the ability to speak up, understanding the relationship between speed and stopping distance, developing strategies to recognise and change harmful ministates and plan ahead to avoid risk.

PCYC and the Albury Highway patrol along with several local businesses representing the national sponsors – Boral, Bridgestone, Toyota, and BOC supported the RYDA workshops. We found a genuine concern amongst the community for the number of tragic youth driver fatalities and serious accidents which reinforced the need to provide the driver safety education program. Club members, volunteers, facilitators and support from – Martins buses, Border Traffic Control, Joss Construction, ACC, DIK West Footscray and the Purple Chicken ensured the workshops were a great success.

Having identified a few minor differences between NSW and Vic in regard to running a RYDA workshop we plan to continue hosting workshops for Albury schools in 2024 and beyond.


